



AN EXTRACT FROM FILMMAKER NII KWATE OWOO


I was shocked, visibly overwhelmed and shaken by what I discovered down there. First, there was this strange and almost mystical aroma emanating from every section of the basement, where hundreds and thousands of rare and sacred artefacts as far as the eye could see were being stored. These stolen and looted ancient artefacts including numerous bronze and other metal statues, big and small, had been hidden and locked up for centuries like a war booty of a conquering colonial army. I became emotional and had to control myself. It was so surreal and unbelievable that it felt as if I had just stepped out of a time machine: One minute I was in the present and the next minute somewhere in 15th-century Africa. In fact I was really traumatized.

A CALL TO ALL PRIVATE COLLECTORS

- It is now incumbent upon you, as private collectors, to act with a sense of moral responsibility and empathy. The artifacts that grace your collections are not merely objects of beauty; they are symbols of identity, heritage, spirituality and pride for the people who have been unjustly deprived of them. It is time to consider the weight of history and the significance of cultural restoration.
- We call upon you to take a bold and unprecedented step: consider the provenance of the artifacts within your collection and, where evidence exists of their unlawful acquisition or historical injustice, engage in dialogue with us. Let us help you towards avenues for restitution and repatriation, whether through negotiation, cooperation or direct returns to the communities to which these treasures truly belong.
- In doing so, you have the opportunity to rectify a historical wrong, to foster international goodwill, and to contribute to a global cultural tapestry that celebrates diversity, respect, and unity. Your actions have the power to enrich not only the lives of those who have long yearned for the return of their heritage but also the collective conscience of our world.
- We urge you to be a part of this transformative narrative, to stand on the side of justice, and to return stolen artifacts for the sake of cultural restoration and a more inclusive, just and compassionate world.

THE CALL TO ACTION

We further make this call to all Private Collectors of ancient treasures of african and indigenous peoples to play a pivotal role in shaping the art and antiquities market, because their choices have far-reaching consequences. It is of paramount importance that collectors, collectively recognize the moral obligation to cease purchasing stolen artifacts. The demand for such items perpetuates the illegal trade, supporting looting, theft, and the illicit removal of cultural treasures from their rightful origins. By refusing to engage in transactions involving stolen artifacts, private collectors can be powerful agents of change, promoting ethical practices and contributing to the preservation of cultural heritage. Please let us join together in this commitment to uphold the integrity and respect of culture, protect the identities of nations, and ensure that art and antiquities are valued for their historical and cultural significance, not the unjust circumstances of their acquisition.


THE CALL TO ACTION

This has opened the door to many requests for other stolen works, treasures, artifacts and etc, to be repatriated.



IN CONCLUSION

The State of the African Diaspora has the mandate from BENIN, GABON, SOUTH AFRICA, UGANDA, DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO, LIBERIA, CHAD, ZIMBABWE, GUINEA, ANGOLA and more are coming. The International Commission of Heritage and Culture is a rapidly growing powerful international body and coalition of States, Kingdoms, Indigenous Nations, NGOs, Lawyers, communities and individuals

We will be writing to the relevant authorities and institutions:

- 1. That the ban is immediately removed from the "You Hide Me" documentary.
- 2. That the State of the African Diaspora, the International Commission for Heritage and Cultural, the countries and nations, experts, lawyers and other African curator experts and specialists, join together with each Western countries governing Council or National Body responsible for cultural heritage to form Commissions to directly commence to discuss making available access to all the underground storage facilities within the UK, US, Europe and elsewhere in the world detaining and hiding these works of art; and work towards the liberation and return of these thousands of stolen items which have no use or consequence to the public at large nor these institutions and recognise the clear and inherent danger of these items being illegally sold at auctions.
